1. THE AUSTRALASIAN WHITE CROSS LEAGUE. A collection of 17 booklets published under the auspices of the league in the 1920s. With titles such as 'Purity and Impurity', 'True Manliness', 'The Vestibule of Girl-Life' and 'What Parents Should Tell Their Children', they are all concerned with sex education. Sydney, 1920s: all in very good condition. **\$395**




2. BALFOUR, J.A. A Sketch Of New South Wales. London, Smith Elder & Co, 1845. First edition: ppvi,136,(24), 8vo, blind stamped cloth gilt. A fine, virtually mint copy. *Ferguson 3980. The author's observations about the Colony - he spent six years living near Bathurst on the western side of the Blue Mountains.* **\$595**

3. BARTON, G. B. Literature in New South Wales [Tog. with] The Poets and Prose Writers of New South Wales. Sydney, Thomas Richards, Government Printer; Sydney, Gibbs, Shallard & Co., 1866. First editions: 8vos, half calf, linen sides. *Of the first, Ferguson 6774 says 'A selective bibliography of New South Wales publications to date of publication, with valuable historical and biographical material and some criticism of the works of the most notable writers. The first attempt to direct attention to the works of Colonial writers'. Ferguson 6776 describes 'Poets & Prose Writers' as 'A supplement to Barton's 'Literature in New South Wales'; this work presents biographies of 14 Colonial writers, including W. C. Wentworth, J. D. Lang, Henry Kendall, Henry Parkes and others.* **\$1195**

4. [BLAND, William]. Letter from the Australian Patriotic Association to C. Buller, Jun., Esq., MP. In support of the petition of the colonists of New South Wales, for the continuance of transportation of convicts to the colony, and of their assignment of private service. May 31, 1839 - Revised March 1843. Sydney, printed by Daniel Lovett Welsh, 1843. First edition: pp66. 8vo, bound, without wrappers, in modern leather, gilt lettering on spine. There is a crease down the centre of the pages (presumably the pamphlet was folded before binding). Some scattered foxing, else very good. *The Mackaness copy, with bookplate. The Australian Patriotic Association was formed in 1835, for the purpose of petitioning for representative government in the Colony. Bland wrote letters to various people of influence, in this case the English member of parliament and reformer Charles Buller. Ferguson 3554.* **\$295**

5. BONWICK, James. Astronomy for Young Australians. Melbourne, Thomas Harwood, 1864. First edition: pp100 (final. adv); sm. 8vo, original limp cloth, gilt lettering. A little staining to endpapers, else a very good, clean copy. *Inscribed to fellow author and historian 'John Shillinglaw from the Author'. Ferguson 7727. Pescott 54..* **\$295**

6. [BOYCE, William, editor]. The Gleaner from August 7 1847, to January 30 1848 Volume 1. Sydney, printed by Robert Barr, 1848. First edition: pp[4], 388. 8vo, bound in full red morocco, stamped in gilt and blind, spines raised in compartments, gilt decorations and lettering. In a matching cloth slipcase. *The first 26 issues of this periodical issued with a title page and Index. The editor was William Boyce of the Wesleyan Mission. The journal deals with Christian matters both in Australia and overseas, and also in general colonial news - immigration, communications between Australia and England, shipping arrivals and departures, visits from overseas dignitaries, pastoral and agricultural news, as well as some poetry and prose. 7. BRAIM, Thomas Henry. A History of New South Wales, from its Settlement to the Close of the Year 1844. Two volumes. London, Richard Bentley, 1846: ppvi,320,342, 2 litho plates, text ill; 8vo, original green cloth, gilt lettering, original cloth laid over new spines, spotting to margins and rear of plates, else a very good set. *Ferguson 4241. Braim, a Church of England Clergyman, arrived in the Colony in 1835 to take up the post of Headmaster of Hobart Town Grammar School. His support of Governor Arthur's liberal policies on education and the aboriginal question brought him into disfavour in Hobart. In 1842, with a recommendation from Bishop Broughton, he was appointed Headmaster of Sydney College (now Sydney Grammar), after the retirement of William Cape.* **\$395**

8. [BROUGHTON, W. G.]. Minutes of Proceedings at a Meeting of Metropolitan and Suf-fragan Bishops of the Province of Australasia, held at Sydney from October 1st to November 1st A. D. 1850. Sydney, printed by Kemp and Fairfax, [1850]: pp24, first and last pages laid down on new paper. Bound in quarter leather, cloth sides, gilt lettering on spine. Scattered foxing and tanning, some chipping to paper edges, else a nice copy in this modern binding. *'The convening and assembling of the Conference of Bishops... in 1850... was the crowning event in Broughton's career' (Whittington). Attended by Bishops Short (Adelaide), Selwyn (New Zealand), Nixon (Tasmania), Tyrrell (Newcastle), and Perry (Melbourne), its purpose was to address problems, both local and of general interest, which faced the Church of England in Australia and New Zealand. The objects of the conference were discussions on future synods and conventions, the disciplining of clergy, the Liturgy, and education, both in schools and the newly formed University of Sydney. Foxing to edges, else very good without dust jacket. *Inscribed 'With best wishes from the Author Xmas 1937'.* **\$75**

11. BURTON, William Westbrooke. The State of Religion and Education in New South Wales. London, J. Cross, Simpkin and Marshall, 1840. First edition: ppixii, 322, cxxxiv (Appendix); large folding hand-coloured map (10cm closed tear on fold) and 5 folding tables. 8vo, original green watered silk boards, gilt lettering and pictorial devices of church and kangaroo on spine. Small closed split to cloth at top of spine, else an exceptionally clean, crisp copy. With the bookplate of Stephen Le Fanu on front pastedown, and inscribed by the author 'To William Watkins Esq., Badby House, Daventry, with the Author's kind regards, 10th August 1840, W. W. Burton'. *The author, a judge of the Supreme Court of New South Wales, wrote this as an appendage to a report to the select committee on transportation. Burton claims that transportation has failed because of lack of religious instruction, and suggests several remedial measures. The strong anti-Catholic bias in the book evoked a reply from Bishop Ullathorne, who said that Burton should never preside in his judicial capacity where a Catholic was either a party or a witness (ADB). Ferguson 2943 (calls for 2 errata slips).* **\$895**

12. CUNNINGHAM, Peter. Two Years In New South Wales; comprising sketches of the actual state of society in that colony; of its peculiar advantages to emigrants; of its topography, natural history, etc. etc. 2 volumes. London, 1827, second edition, revised and enlarged: ppixvi, 346; viii, 336, large folding map, 8vos, bound in half calf with raised spines, marbled boards and edges. Minor rubbing to extremities, a very good set. *Cunningham, surgeon-superintendent of convict ships, made 5 voyages to New South Wales between 1819 and 1828, before taking up land on the Upper Hunter River. He comments on convicts and free settlers, agriculture, (he wanted to import Saxon merino sheep), inland exploration, education and cultural life. Ferguson 1110.* **\$695**

13. ELKIN, A.P. The Diocese Of Newcastle. A History. Sydney, Australasian Medical Publishing Co., 1955. First edition: pp828, b/w plates; roy. 8vo, cloth. A fine copy. *The author is better known as an anthropologist and author of important books on the Australian Aborigines.* **\$45**

14. ESTUDOS COLONIAES. Nova Galles Do Sul (Australia). Lisbon, Imprensa Nacional, 1879: pp40, 8vo, bound in cloth, morocco title on spine, printed paper wrappers bound in. Very good. With the Ingleton Bookplate. *Written in Australia and printed in a number of languages, it was issued in anticipation of the International Exhibition, Sydney, 1879. In Portuguese, it covers geography, climate, agriculture, viticulture, minerals, and government. Ferguson 13496.* **\$295**

15. FERGUSON, J.A.. Bibliography Of Australia 1784-1900. 8 volumes. Canberra, 1980. Facsimile edition: roy. 8vos, hard cover. Very good in dust jackets. *Includes the later published volume of Addenda. Indispensable reference.* **\$595**



16. FIELD, Judge Barron. Geographical Memoirs On New South Wales; by various hands: Containing an account of the Surveyor General's late expedition to two new ports; the discovery of Moreton Bay River, with the adventures for seven months there of two shipwrecked men; a route from Bathurst to Liverpool Plains; Together with Other Papers on the Aborigines, the geology, the botany, the timber, the astronomy, and the meteorology of New South Wales and Van Diemen's Land. London, John Murray, 1825, first edition: ppixvi, 504, aquatint frontis., 4 folding maps, 2 botanical plates; 8vo, half leather, cloth covered boards, spines raised in compartments, gilt lettering and decoration. Rubbing to spine, prelims and finals spotted; else a very good clean copy. *Ferguson 1009; Wantrup p183 'The volume is of high exploration interest. Apart from Oxley's and Uniacke's accounts of the Moreton Bay expedition, it includes the only published account of Alan Cunningham's important exploration to the Liverpool Plains, Currie's excursion south from Lake George, the journal of Barron Field's trip across the Blue Mountains, and many other papers'. Reprints Field's poems 'The Kangaroo' and 'Botany Bay Flowers', which, on their first printing in 1819, were the earliest publication in book form of verse written in Australia.* **\$1650**

18. FOWLES, Joseph. Sydney In 1848: illustrated by copper-plate engravings of its principal streets, public buildings, churches, chapels, etc. from drawings by Joseph Fowles. Sydney, printed by D. Wall, 76 York St, and published by J. Fowles, 5 Harrington St, n.d: pp88, 40 full-page copperplate engravings. 4to, in original blue/green cloth, expertly rebacked with original spine laid down. Lettered in gilt on front board. Spotting to prelims, the text and plates exceptionally fresh and clean. *See Ferguson 4766 for the publishing history of this work. Wantrup pp308-9 '[Fowles's sketches] represent with classical simplicity, in clean, sharp lines the city streets, buildings and interiors of a growing and thriving town in precise architectural detail'. This is the Mackaness copy, with bookplate.* **\$795**


19. FROST, Lawrence. Compendium Of His Views of Australia. The City Views. [Sydney, 1878 or 1879]: Title page and 25 original photographs of Sydney, each with page of descriptive text; 4to, in a later half calf gilt binding, with cloth sides. Some of the text pages have been repaired by expert mounting on paper. Tanning to mounts, but the photographs are in very good condition. *Little is known about Frost and his Sydney photographic practice. The photos appear to have been issued separately, at one shilling each, and 52 pictures were to complete the series. (It appears that only the National Library holds a copy of the Compendium, which has 25 photographs, the same as this one). Frost's title-page states 'To special order these photos. will be prepared by the permanent carbon process, which, having no destructive chemicals in its composition, never fades, nor loses the fresh bloom which is upon the prints when they leave the printer's hands'.* **\$1450**

20. GIPPS, Sir George. Original Land Grant to Thomas Dyer Edwards and Matthew Dysart Hunter, of 1040 acres in the Parish of Majurygong in the County of Murray. Sydney, 21 March, 1839: Folded vellum sheet, with the official seal. *Signed by Gipps, the Governor of the Colony of New South Wales from 1838 to 1846. Gipps aimed to encourage free settlers to the fledgling colony of Australia by granting them crown land, and thus limiting the huge land holdings of the wealthy squatters. Transportation of convicts ended during his Governorship, in 1840.* **\$450**

21. GRANT, James. The Narrative Of A Voyage Of Discovery Performed In His Majesty's Vessel The Lady Nelson in...1800, 1801, and 1802 to New South Wales. London, 1803. 22. GRIEN, Henri Louis. The Adventures Of Louis De Rougemont as told to himself. London, Newnes, 1899, first edition: ppix, 396, with numerous illus; 8vo, pictorial cloth gilt. Spine leaning, edges el. rubbed, else very good. *Henri Louis Grien or Grin, was Swiss born, and came to Australia in 1875 as butler to the new governor of Western Australia, Sir William Robinson. He sailed to Queensland in the pearling cutter 'Ada' in 1877, where he claimed to be wrecked off the Lacrosse Islands. He made his way, via New Zealand, to London, where he published this sensational (and fraudulent) account of his 30 year ordeal as a castaway among the aborigines of Northern Australia. Under the fictitious name of Louis de Rougemont, he has a prominent place among perpetrators of literary hoaxes and imaginary voyages. A copy of the Heinemann Colonial edition is available for \$110.* **\$145**


33. LEE, Mrs R. The Australian Wanderers or the Adventures of Captain Spencer, his horse and dog. Philadelphia, Lindsay & Blakiston, 1854, first US edition: ppxii, 472, (324 adverts), 4 b/w plates by John Skinner Prout; sm. 8vo, original cloth stamped in gilt and blind, a little rubbed at edges, else very good. *Ferguson 11536 (calling for 5 plates). Not in Muir, but see later editions at Muir 4163 (calling for 4 plates).* **\$95**

34. LEON. Standard Cocktails by Leon specially compiled for the home and the man behind the bar. Sydney, Moderne Publications, 1936: illus. advert; sm. 8vo, cloth-backed illus. boards. Very slight flecking, else fine. *A charming and ephemeral item from the Hotel Roberts in Sydney. Rare.* **\$125**

35. [MACARTHUR, Family]. Emigration to New South Wales, with a Statement of the Conditions generally, on which Emigrants wishing to seek Employment in the Service of [blank] in that Colony are received: also, some Account of the Principles and Manner of conducting a former emigration to the same place. A little foxing, else very good. *Ferguson 2486 cites only the Mitchell Library and the National Library copies, and states that in the latter the blank space is filled in by hand with the names of Edward, James and William Macarthur as the prospective employers.* **\$450**

36. [MARSDEN Rev. S]. The Missionary Register for the Year 1815: containing an Abstract of the proceedings of the Principal Missionary and Bible Societies throughout the World. London, L. B. Seeley, 1815: ppxii; 708, folding chart 'exhibiting the rise and progress of Christianity and Mahometanism throughout the world'; 8vo, full modern leather, morocco titling labels. occasional spotting and soiling, else a very good copy of a very scarce book. *The Church Missionary Society published The Missionary Register from 1813-1855. Its first missionaries were sent to New Zealand, (through the auspices of Samuel Marsden) in 1814. The register consists of 12 monthly parts, and there are frequent references to Australian and New Zealand, with letters from Marsden, a notice of the arrival of the first missionary, Mr Kendall, the visit to Port Jackson of Maori chiefs, mentions of the patronage and approval of Governor Macquarie, who appointed Kendall Registrar of the Bay of Islands. Unfortunately, Kendall sold weapons to the Maoris, fuelling the Musket Wars. The 1815 publication is not in Ferguson, who cites only that of 1813 (F. 560)* **\$1995**



39. MEREDITH, Louisa Anne. Notes And Sketches Of New South Wales. During a residence in that Colony from 1839 to 1844. London, John Murray, 1844, first edition: ppxii, 164, sm. 8vo, in the original printed wrappers 'Murray's Colonial and Home Library'. Wrappers soiled and chipped with loss at spine. Otherwise a very good copy, rare in the wrappers. *Ferguson 3865. The Merediths lived at Homebush Bay, before taking up land in Tasmania. This is Louisa Anne's first Australian book, and her frank and often critical comments caused an outcry in the colony when first published.* **\$350**



Sm. 4to, original cloth decorated with Australian flora and fauna, lettering gilt (faded at spine), all edges gilt. Cloth very sl. rubbed at spine ends and corners, some foxing, mainly to prelims, a nice copy. The Tasmanian government awarded Meredith a pension of one hundred pounds in 1884 for 'distinguished literary and artistic services' to the colony. *Ferguson 12515.* **\$195**

From the Mackaness collection, with bookplate. Sir Charles Nicholson was one of the founders of Sydney University, and its first Vice Chancellor. His collection of Antiquities forms the Nicholson Museum at the university. Ferguson 13351 'A lecture delivered by Nicholson 20th May, 1868.'* **\$295**

43. PARKER, Mrs K. Langloh. Australian Legendary Tales. Folk-lore of the Noongahburras as told to the Piccaninies... with an introduction by Andrew Lang. [Tog. with] More Australian Legendary Tales. A lovely copy. *The author states 'illustrations by a native artist and a specimen of a native text'.* *Muir 5711 identifies the artist as Tommy MacCrae, (or McRae), making this one of the earliest books illustrated by an aborigine.* **\$350**

46. REID G. H. An Essay on New South Wales, the Mother Colony of Australia. Sydney, Thomas Richards, 1876, first edition: p174, 2 folding maps and a large bird's-eye plan of Sydney. Bound in cloth, with original wrappers bound in. A fine copy. *Ferguson 14818. Reid was Premier of New South Wales from 1894 to 1899, Prime Minister of Australia [1904-5], and was appointed first Australian High Commissioner in London in 1909.* **\$150**

47. [ROWE, Richard]. Peter 'Possum's Portfolio. Sydney, J. R. Clarke, 1858, first edition: ppviii, 220, errata slip. 8vo, original blind stamped cloth [some expert repairs to spine]. Cloth unevenly faded, edges rubbed. *Includes errata slip. Ferguson 15152. Rowe was on the staff of The Sydney Morning Herald. This, a collection of prose and verse, is his first published book.* **\$195**



John Dunmore Lang

Firebrand Presbyterian minister John Dunmore Lang (1799-1878) arrived in Sydney in 1822 as a youth of 23. He involved himself in all areas of Colonial life, but his chief concerns were education (he was instrumental in the establishment of the Australian College, and Sydney University), immigration (especially of Scots Presbyterians), and independence from Britain. He was gaoled for libel and defamation several times, and was an outspoken member of the NSW Legislative Council, off and on, from the 1840s until the end of his life.


